

Ken Sutterby will be filling the area with stone and Tim ordered switch kits and track materials from Accu-tie. The interior lower level tracks will be one inch square steel tubing welded to ¼ x 1-1/2 inch steel ties. Alan Francis has designed the steel structure for the upper level tracks and he is working on the design for the transfer table.

Childhood Train Memories

From the time I was three years old, trains held a special place in my heart. My maternal grandparents lived in Palmyra, their house perched on a hill that overlooked the bustling tracks of the New York Central Railroad and the West Shore Line. Whenever I heard the distant wail of a steam whistle, I would drop whatever I

was doing and rush out to the back porch, eyes wide with excitement. Moments later, a powerful steam locomotive would roar past, churning out great clouds of smoke, its massive driving rods hammering in perfect rhythm. Whether it was a sleek passenger train, or a freight consist stretching far beyond my view, I was mesmerized by the sheer power and motion of it all.

My grandfather often told me stories about the railroad, explaining the details that fascinated me most. One of my favorite topics was the track pans, long troughs of water laid between the rails. He described how engineers, without stopping, would lower a scoop beneath the tender to collect water. When the tender was full, water would shoot from the hatch like a geyser, a brief, controlled chaos before the engineer sealed it shut, and the train charged forward. I remember picturing that scene in my mind, imagining the skill it took to operate those mighty steam engines.

Another vivid memory was our occasional trip to the Palmyra passenger station, which stood just beyond the Route 21 north overpass. If my grandmother needed to retrieve a package from my uncle, who was serving in the Navy, we would head


down to the station. Sometimes, we went to the freight depot on the opposite side of the tracks, near Walker Road, to pick up larger deliveries. For me, these visits weren't just errands, they were adventures. The station itself had an air of anticipation, a place where people came and went, where locomotives paused just long enough for passengers and cargo before continuing their journeys.

I would watch in awe as a steam engine idled at the platform, its steel frame breathing like a living creature, hissing, sighing, occasionally venting great plumes of steam into the crisp air. The firebox glowed within, radiating heat as it fueled this magnificent machine. Then, all too soon, the conductor's call would signal departure. The engineer would release the brakes, and the locomotive would come to life, its massive drivers turning, pistons pumping, and the deep, mournful wail of its whistle marking its farewell.

Then, one day, something was different. The familiar, thunderous chug of a steam locomotive was gone. In its place was a new sound, steady, mechanical, almost sterile. A diesel locomotive. It didn't hiss, it didn't breathe, it just rumbled. The giants of my childhood, the thundering steam engines that had captivated me, were vanishing.

On May 3, 1957, the New York Central Railroad officially announced the complete dieselization of its system. The era of steam, which had defined rail travel for generations, had come to an end. Five years later, on August 29, 1962, the New York Central closed the Palmyra passenger station, a casualty of declining ridership. Not long after, the station itself was torn down, erasing a piece of history. The freight station lingered on for two more decades, repurposed as a lumber store, until a fire ultimately claimed what was left.

Though the buildings are gone, the memories of steam and steel, of whistles in the night, of childhood wonder standing on that back porch, watching the great locomotives roll by, remain.

The Auburn Road

The Auburn Branch of the New York Central Railroad. 183 pages, soft cover, featuring over 150 photos. The Auburn Road, by Richard F. Palmer and Kenneth E. May, traces the history of the Auburn Branch of the New York Central Railroad and its predecessor lines.

The railroad started as the Auburn & Syracuse Railroad in 1834 and the Auburn & Rochester Railroad in 1836. They merged with each other and later became the Auburn Branch of the mighty New York Central. This book covers the 190-year story of the Auburn Road, from its crude beginnings, when horses drew modified stagecoaches over wooden rails, through today's modern and aggressive Finger Lakes Railway, which rescued what was left of the line from oblivion. Instead of a trackless right-of-way, we now see 2,000-horsepower diesel locomotives, decked out in the classic New York Central "Lightning Stripe" paint scheme, busily serving both old and new freight customers. It is a railroad determined to survive and thrive.
